

Snippets from Recent Club Programs

April 7 -- Joe Girard, "Ball Aerospace Update - Part 2"

Joe Girard, from Ball Aerospace, spoke to our club about a variety of topics such as celestial navigation, atomic clocks, orbits, Lagrange points, James Webb Space Telescope (JWST), and the High Resolution Imaging Science Experiment (HiRISE). He explained that before the Global Positioning System (GPS), we used celestial navigation to get where we wanted to go. It is a position fixing technique that has evolved over several thousand years to help sailors cross oceans without having to rely on estimated calculations, or dead reckoning, to know their position; celestial navigation uses angular measurements taken between a celestial body (the sun, the moon, a planet or a



star) and the visible horizon. He mentioned that NIST in Boulder operates atomic clocks based on the natural frequency of an atom, which are used in global navigation satellite systems such as GPS. The Lagrangian points mark positions where the combined gravitational pull of the two large masses provides precisely the centripetal force required to orbit with them. HiRISE, a Ball experiment, provided the first test images of Mars in 2006. On JWST, Ball provides the optical system that provides the telescope's powerful eyesight. Launch is now projected in 2018. April 14 -- Nila Brummund, as Mary Rippon at University of Colorado

Nila told the life story of Mary Rippon dressed as she would have appeared as a professor at the University of Colorado from 1877-1909. Born in 1850 in Illinois, Mary had a difficult childhood separated from her family at age 6 after her father decided to leave her at a Catholic children's home when he moved west. She excelled in school and became proficient at playing the piano. Using funds from her family's estate, Mary graduated from college at the Illinois Normal School, where Dr. Joseph Sewall was one of her professors. After teaching for a short time in a rural school, Mary immersed herself for five years in the culture of Europe, particularly in Germany where she became



fluent in German. Upon returning to the U.S. in 1877, she was by invited by Dr. Sewall to come to Colorado and teach at the new University of Colorado, which at that time was comprised of just Old Main. Within three years, she became a full professor and departmental head of Germanic languages, a position she held until her 1909 retirement. She continued to live in Boulder, advocating for women's equality and voting rights until she died in 1935. CU's outdoor theatre was named in honor of her in 1939. 
