

Snippets from Recent Club Programs

<u>February 16 – Kimberly Rouland, Boulder Attention Homes</u> Development Associate, "Update on How AH Helps In-Need Youth"

Kimberly gave Foothills Kiwanis members an update about the programs and 2014 results of Boulder Attention Home's programs that help run-away and homeless youth in our community. Their main outreach areas are street outreach, Tuesday-Sunday "day drop-in", and overnight emergency shelter at AH's north Broadway home (12 beds) and south Boulder Chase home (10 beds). The average length of stay at AH is 27 days, with a maximum of 120 days. The youth they help are between 12-20 years old with an average age of 17, where 60 percent come from Colorado and 48 percent from within Boulder County. A startling 30 percent of all youth they help were



recruited at some point by sex traffickers. Kimberly said 83 percent of troubled youth counseled by AH family-mediation program returned to their family. AH has connections with 90 youth-related service providers in Boulder County, with an annual budget of \$1.4 million. This year's AH "Kaleidoscope -- Le Cirque Magnifique" fundraiser will be held on Saturday, May 16 starting at 5:30 pm. at CU's newly renovated Glenn Miller ballroom. <u>March 2 – Lili Adeli, Headmaster of Boulder Preparatory High School,</u> <u>''3-D Printing Class at Boulder Prep''</u>

Lili spoke to club members about the goal of the Boulder Preparatory High School to encourage the pursuit of knowledge and education as an intervention for teens. The staff strives to graduate teens who are eager to meet the challenges of college. With a \$500,000 "21st Century Learning Grant", Boulder Prep has launched new classes, including a class about how to use 3D printers for various purposes. Teacher Ezra Huscher spoke about their 3D Printer



Class that he leads, and students Malcom Penny-Kosser, Dustin Stevens, and Zulzyma Sanches talke about what they've learned in this class about how to make items with their 3D Printer. They all showed examples of what they'd made with their 3D Printer's complex software that builds objects that starts with a flat plate and adds many layers of plastic to form such objects as a whistle.. SECRETARY'S REPORT: A motion was made and seconded the February minutes be approved. Report approved. TREASURER'S REPORT: A motion was made and seconded to approve the February Foundation Treasurer's report. Passed. NEW BUSINESS: Bailey gave an update on The Stars of Tomorrow show scheduled March 15 at CU's Old Main. A motion was made to approve the show as a Club project. Approved.

Amanda works with Kiwanis International publicity, and talked about how to write/submit a community-service article for the

- Go to KI website, click on "Stories", and then on "Share your story"
- Under "Share your story", send email to KI about your story regarding a service project or club activity
- Guidelines Write between 200-500 words, make sure it's your own work, and get permission of everyone in a photo to use their name using a release form, where for Key Club photos get permission from parents
- Best photos to use have faces and smiles, and make sure the setting on the camera is good for focus and exposure
- Look at KI website and magazine for examples.

For putting together a Kiwanis club brochure of webpage --

- Take photos of your club projects and activities, including details and service hours
- Put together a tiered donation plan for club's service projects

- Growing popularity of non-profits and service clubs to do "cause marketing" where they give publicit8y to businesses who provide donations and/or volunteers for club projects
- Some Kiwanis clubs have associated Stars of Tomorrow awards with businesses that have provided donations to it
- The Castlerock Kiwanis Club gives a free Kiwanis membership to a representative of a business that has provided a donation to a club project.

10:45 a.m. Fundraising and Service Projects

Speaker: LeAnn Zetmeier – Grand Junction Kiwanis Club LeAnn talked about a 6:00 a.m.-2:00 p.m. "Pancake Festival" fundraiser done by her Kiwanis Club last year during June --

- They raised \$45,000 from especially corporate sponsorship
- Festival was held at Two Rivers Convention Center where they used its kitchens and serving areas
- They ran the fundraiser like it was a small business trying to reduce expenses wherever possible
- Their club divided into teams to check on potential sponsors, focusing on in-person contacts to improve the success rate for donations.
- She emphasized it's important to celebrate your success!

Speaker: Kaylee Donnish – Palmer Ridge Key Club

- Her Key Club held fall and winter festivals at local schools for games and snacks
- They help the Monument Parent-Teacher Organization by babysitting the kids of parents during meetings.

Boards & Committees Forum – Suggestions were given to shorten the length of Board meetings: We were reminded that Secretary and Treasurer reports do not require votes, and committee reports do not require votes unless there is a suggested action. Budgets and board actions always require a vote. Committees can contain both members and volunteers; it is suggested that a board member chair the committee. Committee recommendations should contain reports of both the majority and minority votes. The Treasurer's books should be audited annually by 2-3 club members. Board minutes are very important and should always show project approvals. These are critical if there is ever a liability claim against the club for a sponsored project or event.

Risk Management – Larry Howell, Kiwanis Rocky Mountain District Risk Manager, reported that our District is doing very well with regard to insurance losses. He noted that historically Kiwanis International has paid \$28M for 49 incidents through its insurance program. As part of risk mitigation, District conferences are required to give a forum on this subject and clubs are required to help their members understand our responsibilities, especially in the area of youth protection. The Kiwanis Youth Protection Guidelines will be distributed during our March 9 meeting. We ask each member to read the guidelines. We must protect our K-family youth; at 300,000 in the US, they now outnumber our Kiwanis members. It is suggested that background checks be completed on all members of the club working with youth. Checks for individuals cost \$10-12/member. The Ft. Collins Kiwanis Club pays \$16/member/year for the entire club so that any member can be called upon to help with a K-family meeting or project in the event of sickness by the club representative.

Directors & Officers (D&O) Insurance – Larry Howell told us that D&O insurance used to be too expensive for many smaller clubs. Now the insurance is a part of our club dues at \$4/member. This insurance covers officers, directors, members and volunteers. We were reminded to complete our club filings to the Secretary of State and the IRS, and to carefully follow all club bylaws and other club documents.

Awards and Recognition – Past District Governor LeAnn Zetmeier presented the 2013-2014 RMD Awards during the Interclub Luncheon. Of note were the following awards: Heart of Kiwanis Award for Service to Foothills Kiwanis Club for the service dog project, and Outstanding Lt. Governor Award to our Division 11 Lt. Gov. Dawn White. Congratulations to Jerry and Linda for all they do for the service dog project and to Dawn White for her outstanding effort with the Division 11 Kiwanis Clubs.

<u>February 7, 2015 "Alert Service Dogs for Kids"</u> <u>Project has booth at American Diabetes Association</u> <u>Expo</u> – Linda McMullen, Alert Dog Program Manager

Jerry Gilland and Linda McMullen representing the Alert Service Dogs for Kids project had a booth at the American Diabetes Association (ADA) Expo in Denver on February 7, 2015. They were supported by several member families, including their children and alert dogs, all of whom were big hits with the crowd of attendees at the Expo. All involved claim it a huge success in terms of interest by attendees, relevance to needs by those children afflicted with diabetes, and as promotion of the project to the public at large.

Dozens of people came by the booth to discuss the specifics of the project, ask questions about how these dogs benefit those afflicted with diabetes, share their own stories, and inquire about how or if their family and diabetic child might become involved in the Academy program. As a result, many brochures and applications for membership in the academy to receive an alert dog were distributed, and beneficial networking for the future of the project was accomplished. There also was much interest by diabetic adults as to whether the Foothills Kiwanis program could help provide any similar service for their needs.

Consequently, a plan is underway to conduct a one-day seminar to help adults train their own dog (or potential dog) in basic obedience and alerting to changes in blood sugar levels. In addition, one of the program's dogs who was recently returned because the family was transferred out of State, found a new home with a diabetic child who visited us at our booth.
