

# Snippets from Recent Club Meetings

#### <u>3/1/21, Division 11 Lt. Governor Michelle Hoffner, State of</u> <u>the Division and District</u>

Michelle Hoffner is the current Lt Governor of the Rocky Mountain District of Kiwanis for Division 11. She has been a member of Kiwanis for five years starting with the Longmont Skyline Kiwanis Satellite 3-2-1 Club and helping form the Broomfield North Metro Kiwanis club where she is now a member. Michelle is a Colorado native who grew up on a farm north of Greeley and has been in the Denver Metro Area for over 20 years and has lived in Broomfield for the past 18 years. Professionally Michelle works as an actuarial consultant



in the HealthCare space guiding hospital systems, insurance companies, state and federal government agencies through regulatory changes and contract negotiations. Outside of work Michelle enjoys camping and fishing with her dogs (Mojo & Rebel), golfing, traveling, playing, and watching volleyball. She is passionate about spending time spoiling her nieces and nephews and volunteering with Kiwanis. Covid has taken a toll on many District and Division clubs during the past year. Three clubs have been lost in the District, and several more are struggling. Circle K is struggling worldwide. Carbon Valley went under. Golden Nugget is not meeting. District had 40+ new members in 19/20 which equaled \$4,000 given out in District awards. This year, the hope is for more new members and more awards presented. Many of the members are moving for job reasons. To expand membership, we need to focus on potential members who are moving into the area. Division 11 is supporting the District with its Master Class Series starting with Fund Raising in April. This gives us an opportunity to hear from the

neighboring clubs on topics of interest. Future topics are "Membership' in May, "Strong Community Connections" in July, and "Building a Strong Foundation" in August. Upcoming activities are Boulder County Fair Parade Gering, NE, on August 5<sup>th</sup> thru 8<sup>th</sup>. In the Division, we are looking for volunteer clubs to help get a club going in Erie. No one is willing to open a club just to open a club. Another question center around strengthening existing clubs versus starting new clubs. To get clubs off the ground such as Erie, downtown businesses need to be involved and new, strong leadership is needed within the clubs. In addition, people are busy and getting a new club started is extremely time consuming. It does not make sense to put in time and effort only to watch a club fold. New clubs have the best chance if they are started in areas of heavy building. We appreciate Michelle presenting to our club and informing us as to the challenges facing Division 11 and the Rocky Mountain District.

#### 3/8/21, Gordon Page, Spirit of Flight Foundation

Gordon Page is the founder of the Spirit of Flight Foundation and is an author who has written books on air travel to educate the public on flight. He has over 1 million air travel miles. His latest book, "C29B" describes travel stories, the need for flight etiquette, and characters encountered during those many flying miles. Gordon hosted and produced a television show "Chasing Planes" which is on Amazon. His next book is a fictional story entitled "Flight for Life"



which is about a veteran who intends to kill himself on a final flight. Gordon does sales appraisals of vintage aircraft for a living. He has done appraisals on the Spruce Goose, Elvis Presley's planes, a Messerschmidt 109, a WWII Japanese Zero, and a Grunman space suit. The Spirit of Flight Foundation is an all-volunteer, nonprofit, organization that seeks to educate the public on the history of flight. The original site for the foundation was sold and the organization spent a year and a half looking for a new site. They then leased a site, but the original lease had 17 unacceptable points. The foundation spent a lot a money on the new place and it is still not complete. Gordon told some amusing stories around the theme "you never know what you will see on an airline today" One of his stories included a passenger who

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#### 3/22/21, Cliff Bosley, Update on the Bolder Boulder

Cliff Bosley has been the Director of the Bolder Boulder since 1998. He took over from his Dad, who started the now famous event. Cliff was born and raised in Boulder and went to Boulder High. Cliff was 12 years old in 1979 when the inaugural race was run. Cliff and his sister worked along the route for the first four years of



the race. Since 1979, there have been 41 races. In 2020, the Boulder City Manager issued a 10-person restriction on attendance at the race. The race organizers all thought this was a temporary situation, and 51,000 printed t-shirts arrived from China. So, a virtual race was held on 5/25/20. It was very gratifying when 14,000 racers signed up and turned in their race times. The virtual race still raised \$26,770. On Labor Day, there was a planned event called Bolditude, which was a 10K virtual race. Times are still being collected and scored. Also, all the gear and equipment from the inperson race had to be stored in a warehouse for three months. There was rent on the warehouse. However, in late November, several old trailers were donated to the race committee for equipment storage. This saved a considerable amount of money. In February, many of the printed 2020 t-Clearance Sale". The theme was "buy a piece of history for the year that wasn't". This generated enough cash flow to last sponsored a 12-day event called "Colder Bolder" with prizes given out each day. Any physical event such as snow shoveling qualified for points. Everyone got at least a medal. Over 50,000 shirts were donated to the **Denver Rescue** Mission and Samaritan's Purse. There was a VBFC award "Heart of Bold" virtual event. This was a 5K run that also introduced a dog element into the proceedings. This year on

Memorial Day Weekend there is a new concept three-day event planned called "Bolder on the Run" which will take place on close contained courses in six countries. 2,600 people have signed up for this international event so far. Also, this gives and opportunity for a race in person. This event will serve as a place holder for a live event in 2022. Our Foothills Kiwanis club looks forward to resuming our involvement when the BB goes back live. We applaud the race committee for all their positive responses to keep BB active during these difficult times.

#### 3/29/21, Zach Kreeger, Young Life During the Pandemic

Zach Kreeger is the Director of the Broomfield/Boulder Chapter of Young Life. Zach has a degree in Classical Literature and Christian Education from Viola University in California. A Broomfield native, Zach moved back here after college and received a master's degree in Christian Leadership and Theology. Zach and his wife Lydia are



the parents of two boys. The goal of Young Life is to bring Junior High and Senior High age kids to Jesus. During the pandemic, the motto of the organization has been "Separately Together". The pandemic has negatively affected the emotional health of many teens. Young Life has a unique approach to being there for the teens. Since 1941, the approach of YL is to show up on the kids turf to reach out to kids who do not know Jesus. During the pandemic, Young Life expanded their approach by meeting in parks so they could socially distance. This proved to be an affective approach. Many of the clubs grew in attendance. 84% of the kids say they are getting more sleep and 56% are spending more time with their parents. However, this can be a doubleedged sword if the kids are in a violent or disconnected family situation. During the pandemic, 56% of all teens are suffering from anxiety, and 45% are depressed. The kids do what adults do. There is an increase in substance abuse during these times. Providing a mentor for these kids is the number one factor for future success. Developmentally, the kids flourish in Young Life mentoring programs. There are events every week. Trivia Night, Laser Tag, and bowling are examples of the activities. Games are modified to allow for social distancing. Online Bible studies did not do well, but live studies are drawing better attendance. Recently, 50 kids showed up in a church study group just so they could be together. Getting access to the schools from the

administration is sometimes a challenge. The Young Life approach when they enter a school is not to use message tee shirts or shove Bibles into the kid's faces. They start out by being friends with the kids and doing anything they can to get exposure such as being crossing guards. There is no agenda when they come into a school, they simply build personal relationships. During the pandemic, there have been some baptisms: 21 of 45 student leaders have been baptized. During the pandemic, Young Life has lost student leaders and some staff. The organization is financially at half of where they usually are during normal times. There will be camp this summer. Parents are anxious to get the kids out of the house. There is a worry that there is not going to be enough staff to cover all the kids in attendance. If every teen had an adult who cared about them, there would be no trouble teens. Adults matter when they simply smile at a teen. Many teens feel that they are an annoyance to adults. Teens are drawn to the oldest person in the room who care about them. Mentoring is important to teens, but it takes a while to show results. There is now a legacy gift program started and all donations would be welcome. Foothills Kiwanis presented Zach with a \$2000 donation during the meeting.
