Snippets from Recent Club Programs

March 10 -- LeAnn Zetmeir, Kiwanis RMD Governor, "RMD Update"

Kiwanis Rocky Mountain District Governor LeAnn spoke to our club members about how important it is for Kiwanis Clubs to increase their membership to keep Kiwanis going. The best way to do this is by providing a choice of service projects/activities ranging from local community-service projects (such as our club's Alert Dog Program) to helping kids internationally (such as our club's support of the Kiwanis Club of Kiev's project to provide summer youth camps). Especially important in the international area is Kiwanis clubs providing donations to the Kiwanis International "ELIMINATE Project" to save babies in third-world countries from dying a painful death within seven days of birth. Every



\$1.80 donated saves one baby from dying, so through our club's \$4500 ELIMINATE donation last year, our club saved 2500 babies. LeAnn also noted the importance of Kiwanis clubs supporting Kiwanis youth-oriented programs (K-Kids for grades 1-8, Key Clubs/Key Leader for high schools, and Circle K for colleges). She was appreciative that our club supports all of these programs in the Boulder area.

March 17 -- Jessica Yanker, "Orphanage Project in Costa Rica"

Jessica gave a presentation about the children's service project she and boyfriend Zach Schambow will be doing this May at an orphanage in Costa Rica through the International Volunteer HO organization (see --

www.volunteerhq.org). To avoid administrative overhead, IVHQ (founded in 2007) is funded through its volunteers paying a \$300 program fee directly to the incountry IVHQ partner for volunteer activities. In Jessica and Zach's case, this is "Maximo Nivel" non-profit based in San Jose, Costa Rica. The fee covers Jessica and Zach's food, accommodations, and local airport transportation, with anything left over going to the Maximo Nivel organization. Although they won't know exactly their roles until they arrive, possible projects include --

- Helping kids at the "Lighthouse Orphanage", especially immigrant children from Nicaragua
- Organizing games and activities at a school, day-care center, or community center
- Helping serve meals at a San Jose soup kitchen, and
- Organizing games and activities at a community center.

We are looking forward to Jessica visiting our club again after she and Zach return from Costa Rica to talk about their experiences helping orphanage children there.

Foothills Kiwanis Stars of Tomorrow" Talent Contest

On Sunday, March 16 at the Diary Center for the Performing Arts in Boulder, the 62nd Annual "Stars of Tomorrow Youth Talent Show" was held from 1-3:30 p.m. This event (cosponsored by the Foothills Kiwanis Club and the Parlando School for the Arts) saw 29 contestants from grades 4-12 give musical, voice, and dancing performances. The respective agegroup winners will compete again at the Rocky Mountain District "Starts of Tomorrow" talent show on Saturday, April 26 in Loveland. (at the Mountain View High School Auditorium, 3500 Mountain Lion Drive). The District Show first-place winner will be given a \$1250 scholarship; secondplace, a \$750 scholarship; and third-place, a \$500 scholarship. All scholarships will go towards helping pay the tuition costs for the recipients after their acceptance at a university this fall.
